Sayyid Al-Hakeem from Al-Battat Guesthouse: Emphasizes Religious Authority, Tribes' Role to Preserve Iraq, Addresses North Basra's Issues



During His Eminence's visit to Al-Battat guesthouse, the residence of the late Sayyid Falih Al-Battat, Sayyid Ammar Al-Hakeem, Head of the National State Powers' Alliance, met with a large gathering of distinguished sayyids, tribal sheikhs, and dignitaries from North Basra.
